Potential impact on other services - accident and emergency

When a child is unwell the first point of contact for a parent with a sick child should always be the child's GP. They can advise where the child should be treated. If a child needs medical attention when the GP surgery is closed, parents should contact NHS 111 who will refer the child to the most appropriate place for their care.

A protocol setting out the arrangements for any child who comes into accident and emergency will be in place.

Key points

- Arrangements for children with major injuries remains unchanged – the ambulance by-passes the Friarage Hospital and goes straight to The James Cook University Hospital.
- Arrangements for children with minor injuries (the vast majority of the 6,000 children who attend A & E every year) remain unchanged and children will still go to the Friarage Hospital.



For all other children:

- The GP will determine where child would be best seen. This could include the paediatric short-stay assessment unit at the Friarage (after discussion with a paediatrician) up to 7pm, the paediatric day unit or children's ward at The James Cook University Hospital or, very exceptionally, accident and emergency at James Cook (if resuscitation is required).
- If a child needs to be admitted to hospital, or assessed, after 7pm, they will be directed to The James Cook University Hospital or Darlington Memorial Hospital.
- If a child is brought to the Friarage
 Hospital's accident and emergency
 department with an illness they will be
 triaged (assessed) and then seen in the
 appropriate care setting which will be:
 - The James Cook University Hospital (oncall paediatric team)
 - GP (making an appointment for that day)
 - Out-of-hours GP
- Children attending accident and emergency at the Friarage who give any cause for concern will receive supportive treatment until an appropriate transfer is arranged.
