The Council continues consultation on its budget proposals.

WHAT do your refuse collection, the quality of your child's education, the state of the footpaths and the amount of Council Tax you pay have in common?

They are all directly affected by the setting of Darlington Council's annual budget – now you can have your say on where the money goes.

The Council is presently working on its budget for the coming year, with a wide variety of issues to take into account.

This leaflet tells you many of the things you need to know about the impact of the financial decisions being taken and, crucially, how you can affect them.

Please take a few minutes to read about the Council's budget, how it affects you and then give us your thoughts.



The Council's budget and how it is spent

The Council's Cabinet, which is made up of senior councillors, is planning to spend £200m next year. This money will be spent on an enormous range of services, with the main ones being:

- Schools;
- Care for children and elderly people;
- Refuse collection, street cleaning and other environmental services;
- · Roads and footpath repairs;
- Sports, leisure and arts facilities such as the Dolphin Centre, Arts Centre and Civic Theatre.

The money for all of this comes from several sources – grants from the Government (55%); income from Council Tax (17%); service users (13%); business rates (14%) and the Council's own reserves (1%).

The challenges we face

The budget that has been suggested would allow the majority of public services to be maintained at the same level you have seen over the past year. Some services will be improved in line with public consultation

It also takes into account emerging challenges that Darlington Council, like countless other local authorities across the country, faces.

These include:

- A further £1.5m being spent on caring for elderly people;
- An extra £1m needing to be spent on waste disposal and recycling issues;
- A new national free travel scheme for pensioners that will cost about £750,000.

The Council must also become more efficient. Darlington has a good track record in this area, having reduced costs by some £17m in the past ten years and more efficiency savings are part of this proposed budget. Value for money is a key aspect of any budget and external inspectors gave Darlington top marks for value for money, so you can see we are working hard to spend your money wisely.

A balancing act

The upshot of all this is that the Council's Cabinet faces the financial equivalent of a balancing act – striking a balance between what it spends and what it brings in, and a balance between the needs of the public and the level of Council Tax for the coming year.

The options

To strike that balance, the Cabinet needs to either reduce spending on public services or increase income by £2.6m. This leaves three options:

- · Reducing spending on public services;
- · Increasing Council Tax;
- Increasing fees and charges for services.


The proposals

What Cabinet is proposing is a mix of all three: reducing spending on services by £1.8m, raising Council Tax by 4.9 per cent and increasing fees and charges by £500,000.

This will lead to the majority of existing services remaining in place and a number of services being improved.
