1	Email	07/12/2011	I note from the Town Crier that you are seeking to negotiate a 3 year pay freeze for all council employees, I assume this is in addition to the 2 years already in place or is it another further year. If indeed this equates to 5 years in total I feel this most unfair. You propose a rise in council tax, energy bills are rising together with the cost of living, just how do you expect people to live. The government has capped rises to 1% nothing really but better than no rise at all and I feel that this is the least rise employees should be given. I await your reply with interest.
1	Email	10/01/2012	Thank you for your response regarding the pay freeze or other options, am I right in assuming this is for all council employees from the top down.
1	Event	12/12/2011	Wage Freeze – biggest single saving you are trying to make. You can either freeze pay or lose staff. With inflation compounded over 5 years, it results in 30% pay cut. What other things are you planning to do if this is not accepted.

2	Forum	24/11/2011	A three year pay freeze on top of the two year pay freeze council employers have already had then a 1% wage reduction then to have to pay more in pension contributions (if the government get their way) I would have thought the employees are the most valuable asset the council have, moral must be at an all time low, this must have a very detrimental effect on the way services are delivered, a poor service cost more in the long term so would the council save as much as the pen pushers say they will. So employees will in effect have a pay cut of at least 2.2%. With the rising costs of petrol, gas, electricity and food, employees are really going to struggling. Factor in the proposed increase in pension contributions and things get even worse. Yes, people are glad they have a job but bearing in mind that many of the lower paid workers are already stretched to the limit, this could be the straw that breaks the camel's back. Add to this the concerns that workers have trying to tell people that they can't have services due to budget cuts, and we will end up with a depleted workforce as staff go off sick with stress. Staff that are left will be over worked and residents of Darlington will have to wait longer for the services that they are able to have. Its going to have a knock on effect that will affect all the residents of Darlington

He is a changed man in just a few weeks. On hearing that the bus service is part of the cuts he is devastated. This is an amazing service which gives people a reason to get up in the mornings! I understand cuts have to be made but why spend money on flowers for the town centre and entertainment in the market square and then cut vital services like this? Please consider the impact that reducing these services will have.

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5	Forum	30/12/2011	Charge pensioners £20 a year for their free bus passes and reinstate the Arriva services to such as Brafferton and the outer villages.
5	Letter	25/01/2012	Review GOLD and other support for older people to target the work more closely, develop community and social networks in a more streamlined way. Evidence suggests that this information provides longer term savings as fewer adults needing care at an early stage as a result. GOLD should be transferred to Age UK with a minimum of one year's fund raising support. Age UK would be able to build GOLD into a stronger entity.

I honestly don't know how you can come up with such a notion in all good conscience and if you lived one day in the life of a severely disabled person I am sure you would see what a harsh and cruel cut this is. 12	Letter	26/01/2012	Age UK would have serious concerns about introducing a charging policy for a service designed to support vulnerable people particularly where income is mostly derived from the benefit system. If charging reduces an individual's income below the minimum income for anyone age 70 or over they can ask for the charges to be reviewed. The cost of implementing and charging and review service could be greater than the income generated unless there are a higher number of people with income above the minimum. The way forward could be to look at other ways to enable and empower people to manage their own finances eg through supporting people services, financial advocacy or opportunities presented by the personalisation agenda.

I will do this with utter confidence that the parent will be dealt with in a professional and caring manner and that the Manager's experience, which is vast, will assist them in ensuring that their child's needs are met according to their wishes.

My own school has used the service lots in the past and presently to support our parents of children with SEN. She has supported them in writing their parental views for moderation panel, she has attended annual reviews. She has organised visits to secondary schools and attended with vulnerable parents. She has signposted us to appropriate services for our families and much much more. Many of our parents rely on her support to help them through the minefield of bureaucracy. Lots of our parents just need someone who will listen and who is impartial. It is such a pity that this invaluable support will not be available to our school and our families.

It is hard to imagine at this point how anyone with less experience and/or qualifications will be able to pick up this work in any meaningful way.

We have relied on this service to form the precious link with parents because we often do not have the time to sit and listen to parents and talk through the SEN processes from a neutral point of view. It seems that the powers that be are now completely disregarding children who have special educational needs and stripping these services, leaving schools adrift and without support for these, often extremely vulnerable children and parents. Please pass on my views if you are able.
58	Email	18/11/2011	I am very disappointed to hear that the work done in Darlington by the Parent Partnership Service, is being downgraded. As Principal of Dyslexia Action in Darlington I am aware of the parents who contact us in need of advice and guidance. One of the major recommendations we at Dyslexia Action make is that parents contact PPS as we know that the Parent Partnership Manager will make every effort to help parents to understand the situation from all angles and to come to a mutually-agreeable solution with their child's school and/or the Local Authority. Parents who have been accompanied to meetings have reported feeling so much more confident and comfortable than in previous meetings because the atmosphere becomes quieter and less stressful with the emphasis on arbitration when She is present. A friend at the other end of the telephone is all some people need and this they get, and in a very short time despite her workload. The low numbers of cases going to arbitration bear witness to the service effective over several years. As a member of the Parent Partnership Steering Group I am aware of and appreciate all the hard work the Manager has done to raise the Service's standards to such a high level and her plans to maintain or indeed improve these standards. She has immense experience, which as a specialist in dyslexia for over 20 years, I understand and value. In conclusion, although I understand the need to cut costs in the Local Authority, I feel strongly that a great asset would be lost if she does not continue in her role. I also feel that without her skills and experience the cost to the Local Authority will ultimately be far greater than the short-term savings made by down-grading the position . Thank you for considering my views.
58	Email	21/11/2011	I was horrified to hear that as part of the review of information services, that the present role of Parent Partnership under the guidance of this Manager is under threat and change. I have worked very closely with her in supporting parents of children with special needs in ensuring they receive the best support and guidance they can have. Her support and knowledge in many of these cases has assisted us in helping these children in our school and then through the process of transition. I have also witnessed how her support, care and advice has helped support many of these families with issues at home and how through her development of the PPS network, she is able to sign post families to the correct support groups who can help. Her knowledge and dedication have also been invaluable to me as a SENCO when I have required help in locating the best support or advice on how to support families or how to arrange visits to different educational settings if required. Without her, I would not have had the successes I have had in placing children in the correct secondary setting for their needs. I fully appreciate that these are extremely difficult financial times and that cuts sadly do need to be made. However already, the SEN section has been extremely cut back to what feels like the very bare bones. This group of vulnerable children and their families should not have to have a lower grade service of support. Already there are fewer services readily available for schools and parents to contact I would think it essential we have a strong parental support service ran by a highly qualified person with the Educational Law Training the DFE want and a wealth of knowledge to support families in a much smaller, restricted service. In addition with the new white paper for SEN and the importance of parental power and rights, surely we require PPS to run as it presently does to show that as an authority we are meeting the needs of all of our children. Please can I urge you to look again very closely at the proposed changes to PPS.
58	Email	25/11/2011	I am writing to express unhappiness and dismay at the recent proposals to finish the Manager at the Parent Partnership Service Manager despite her workload more than tripling in referrals during the month of October(2011) in comparison to the same time last year. (My understanding is that there have been 50 referrals compared to 14) It appears that the proposals are to replace the existing service manager with a much lower grade officer who will not need to have a professional qualification, degree or knowledge of the SEN Code of Practice. Having recently accessed the service regarding a current pupil the support, advice and guidance provided by the Manager has been invaluable. Her knowledge and expertise have given both the parents and ourselves confidence and direction in meeting the needs of our pupil. I am writing to stress the importance of having an experienced and appropriately qualified person in the position of Service Manager. Her advice, guidance, input, knowledge and expertise to those accessing the service would be a great loss and if the proposals go ahead it would diminish the quality and value of the service that you currently offer to parents, pupils and schools.

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58	Email	29/11/2011	<p>I have recently learnt important information that the Parent Partnership Manager may be leave Darlington Parent Partnership and be replaced with a much less qualified person. I would appreciate if you could read my concerns and take them in to consideration when evaluating your decisions with regards to this.</p> <p>Parent Partnership Manager is a well respected "partner" to many families with disabled children and has been a strong influence as well as strength to the families themselves. I don't expect people who make such decisions to about government cut backs in Darlington to understand as it seems to be common practise that they never seem to meet the families and see the needs, stresses and struggles unlike her. I have had several experiences of this with PCT and other local authorities. Just recently there has been a re-shuffle in the SEN team in Darlington which has been a complete joke and has resulted in many children with additional needs not getting into schools including Harriette my own child. Why? Because someone decided to replace the main person with an employee from the housing department. This resulted in statements not being filed in time, schools not being ready and able to offer the provisions straight away. My daughter's case included!!!! Parent Partnership Manager was the only person to offer support, knew the right people to speak to, what meetings should take place, who should be there, and offering my family the support we needed. If it was not for Parent Partnership Manager the situation could have been a lot worse.</p> <p>People comment how doctors and consultants work such very long hours, well let me share with you that parents of disabled children work even longer hours. We are the consultant, the nurse, the stock taker and orderer, pharmacist and physio therapist, the speech and language therapist, the health and safety officer, the employer of carers, the dietician as well as being a parent to our children. I speak on behalf of all the parents in Darlington that we need the support of Parent Partnership Manager. The support and advice she gives in crucial we as parents have a lot to do on a day to day basis. Would you expect a doctor not to have a receptionist? Why? Because a receptionist helps the doctor attend to his/her patients. We need Parent Partnership Manager, without her along side her experience, knowledge and expertise you will find parents depressed, suicidal or on a brink of a nervous breakdown with this "merry go round" of trying to get the correct provision for our children in the schools. There will be a lack of communication which Parent Partnership Manager always makes sure there is plenty of. I feel that if such a decision is made to let Parent Partnership Manager go from her role really the person making the decision does not understand the word "partner" in parent partnership. Parent Partnership Manager is our Partner to all of the families she deals with on a day to day basis. I understand fully about cut backs and reorganising teams, but if the decision is made to let such a pillar of strength go from such an important organisation I really do feel that the management should be also looked at. I say this as it shows extreme poor management and lack of understanding of disabled children and their families.</p>

The quantity of traffic already using Hummersknott Avenue is heavy at all times of the day, and is more like a main road or a 'rat run' during peak school times, especially since the speed bumps were put in at Hummersknott Academy and at night, now that the Academy has opened for out of school hours and weekend activities (which wasn't discussed with local residents). Also, traffic speeds are worrying as they go up and down the road at these times. Residents have problems getting out of their own drives and have now taken to parking on the grass verges, I'm concerned that, one day, there may be a serious accident. Parents from both schools already park in Hummersknott Avenue to pick up their children, meaning the road can be extremely tight for other traffic to get through, especially the local bus. I am assuming these are counted as being our closest schools. Along the route to Hummersknott there must be a large number of children collected. There was very little information in there and at first glance would appear not to affect people living in Heighington or the Chestnuts. Surely the obvious solution is that Hummersknott Academy invoke their powers as an Academy to stipulate that Heighington School is a feeder school for Hummersknott Academy. The proposal to send our children to other schools such as Longfield or Branksome, which is only 0..2 miles closer and currently does not offer a bus service without having to first go into town and then back out, is wholly unacceptable, even if they were in the same league as Hummersknott or Carmel which clearly they are not. And our other options of the nearest schools being Greenfield and Woodham are Durham County Council, not Darlington Borough Council to whom we pay our taxes and once again I would contend are not in the same league as Hummersknott and Carmel. We currently have 2 children attending Hummersknott Academy, who have exceptional academic and sporting reports and it is our intention to send our youngest child to Hummersknott, but as we will have no sibling link by the time he is due to commence senior school because his sister will have left in July before he is due to commence in September, we are very upset about the current proposals and the appalling lack of communication or consultation. I understand that you hope to meet with Pat Howarth, Head of Hummersknott Academy, at a School Governors' meeting at Hummersknott today, so I would ask for our objections on behalf of many parents, who have no knowledge or understanding of the real implications of such measures being rushed through, to be taken into consideration.</p>

I live on the Chestnuts estate in School Aycliffe and have a child who currently attends Hummersknot School and there uses transport provided by the local authority to get to and from school. I also have a child currently attending Heighington Primary School who is due to move to secondary school in September 2013. I understand that children from this estate and also from the village of Heighington are currently given places at Hummersknott due to the transport link however from 2013 the transport link will not form part of the criteria for the allocation of places and distance from the school will be the main criteria. I presume therefore that on this basis children from our estate will be allocated places at Branksome as this appears to be the nearest school within the Borough.</p> <p>The Principle of Hummersknott has advised that our second child should still qualify for a place at the school on sibling links however, if we take up such a place we will be deemed to have chosen not to send our child to the nearest school and therefore our second child will not qualify for free transport to the school even though we live in excess of 3 miles away. So if we were to "choose" to send our second child to Hummersknott then we would be in the position of having 2 children attending the same school with the eldest child being able to use the free local authority transport but having to make separate travel arrangements for the second child.</p> <p>The distance to the nearest secondary school within the Borough is however in excess of 3 miles so presumably the Local Authority would then need to provide transport for the children from our estate and those in Heighington whilst still providing transport for those already attending Hummersknott.</p> <p>I presume that the main driver behind these proposals is to reduce costs as I understand that the minimum distance for free transport is to be increased from 2 miles to 3 miles.</p> <p>However this does not have any relevance to our location as it is approximately 7.5 miles to Hummersknott and 6.5 miles to Branksome. So the Local Authority will still be providing free transport for the children from this area just to a different destination. As a concerned parent I feel this would have a massive impact on the whole of the village. Hummersknott School provides a good level of education with a good standard of examination results, far higher than those currently achieved by Branksome School which I believe is the school they are proposing to provide transport to for the village children. An increase in the distance students need to live from Hummersknott Academy to qualify for free transport, from 2 to 3 miles. Anyone living less than 3 miles will have to arrange their own transport.2. An end to Associated Transport. Meaning that students living in Skerne Park, High Coniscliffe, Piercebridge, the Teesdale approaches, Heighington area and "The Chestnuts Estate" would no longer be guaranteed a place at Hummersknott. I do not understand how the Council plan to show how cutting the transport links will save money when they cannot supply information about either how much the associated transport currently costs, nor how much will be 'saved' once they have to establish a transport link to a school that is merely 0.2miles closer to us than Hummersknott. If they could clarify their intentions and the thinking behind the proposed changes in an open and honest manner to those affected - I think they would find that there is in fact a huge opposition to these proposals and we would welcome the opportunity to voice it to them through the correct channels. My intention was to write to the council along the following lines, and advise that these are the questions that I intend to ask at the open meeting in Heighington, so could they come with answers. The bus issue is clearly an attempt, by the council, to reduce it's budget by using a stealth tax against the most vulnerable of tax payers, the ones who would accept it (the middle classes). It is already worrying that parents are talking of accepting this, at a time when we are being hardest hit by the recession. With regard to its reduction in budget, I think it reasonable to ask what other areas of the budget / services were considered for cutting and why these were ruled out / in. I think it also wise to ask, at what point was the council considering this, when did they raise it with the schools and the general public, as there appears to have been an agenda to keep this information quiet and without you, the head teachers and subsequent parent emails, this could have worked. I would also like to see the potential saving projected on this, and the costs associated with running 2 buses, presumably one to Branksome and Hummersknott, for children still entitled to use it. In fact one could argue that a bus going to Hummersknott via the dog inn, avoids Darlington congestion, is not idle in standing traffic and is therefore a safer, greener and more cost effective solution.</p>
23	Email	15/01/2012	<p>This is a formal objection to the proposal to end the provision of 'associated transport' within the identified budget cuts given for consultation. Through the 'associated transport' link children from Heighington Primary School have received their secondary education at Hummersknott Academy, a situation the vast majority of parents in the area are satisfied with. The school provides a well established and proven educational experience, with good academic results and a sense of community with the Heighington area. The removal of the 'associated transport' link for children moving into secondary education from 2013 is to be replaced with 'provision to the nearest school only' and would effectively destroy that community link with a good school and replace it with two poorer performing schools by providing transport to either Darlington School of Mathematics and Science (DSMS) or Longfield Academy. Both DSMS and Longfield are considered 'improving' schools but both as yet provide significantly lower results at GCSE level than Hummersknott Academy. Indeed, at DSMS, only 35% of their pupils achieved grade "C" or above in their GCSE exams in 2010, compared with 62% of Hummersknott pupils.</p> <p>As a result of the above the children from the Heighington area will be effectively penalised and have their future prospects put at risk in order for Darlington Borough Council to make alleged savings of £14000 per year.</p> <p>Our children are the future and Darlington Borough Council must recognise the need to invest in the future. In addition, Longfield Academy and DSMS are both smaller schools than Hummersknott Academy and therefore there is the potential that one school may not be able to take all the pupils from Heighington Primary School.</p> <p>This may result in children being scattered between one or more schools, possibly including Hummersknott Academy, thereby exaggerating the effect of different educational provision and also the destruction of the community link as friendships are torn apart at a time when children already feel vulnerable.</p> <p>We have been given no rational arguments as to how the Council will decide which of the Heighington children will benefit from attending Longfield and which children will be sent to DSMS - a school recently made an "Academy", to avoid special measures, rather than because of academic excellence. A number of children across the Darlington area from different schools, but significantly the issues are likely to be greater for those children from the more rural communities.</p> <p>These children should not be disadvantaged by effectively being offered places at schools which the Council cannot fill, because parents do not wish to send their children there. These cuts appear to us to be fundamentally flawed and likely to lead to an increase in costs Heighington is situated some 5 to 6 miles from all schools and has no other link to the schools other than by road, there will still be a requirement to provide 'free' transport, so a school bus will still run.</p> <p>Due to the distances involved for children from the Heighington area there appears to be no impact when in fact the exact opposite is the case. why has there not been an alternative proposal of placing a levy on 'associated transport' links in order to maintain the service whilst trying to reduce costs?</p> <p>If this proposal goes ahead and Heighington Primary School essentially feeds into an inferior secondary school, then the Heighington area will cease to provide an attractive base for family life. Finally, one of the foundation principles contained in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child which underpins all other children's rights is that a child's "best interests must be a primary consideration" in all actions and decisions concerning him or her and must be used to resolve conflicts.</p>

We are both serving police officers in Darlington and bought a house on the Chestnuts in 2003 as we were planning to start a family within a couple of years and knew that the schools we were likely to be offered were Heighington Primary and Hummersknott or Carmel Comprehensive schools. We did not take the decision to move out of Darlington lightly but felt that owing to our profession we wanted to put a little distance between our family and work life. The twins were accepted into Heighington Primary in September 2009 and we had hoped that they would move onto one of the two excellent secondary schools. I am sure you can appreciate our utter horror when we heard the proposals. My husband was once the Beat Officer for Branksome and I was the Beat Officer for Longfield Road / Harrogate Hill. We never imagined that one day we would be faced with the prospect of sending our children to those schools.</p> <p>I am appalled that having bought a house in a nice area with good schools it appears that we are to be cast aside and expected to send our children elsewhere. I grew up in the Hummersknott area, indeed our family home backed onto Carmel school, and I attended Hummersknott along with my brother.</p> <p>I am extremely concerned that my children are now about to lose out on an excellent education and will be forced to mix with children from families we deliberately moved away from. Moving children from a well-performing and well-run school to a poorer performing school in a less affluent area will badly affect our children's' education and social skills. Some parents may easily be dissuaded from this line of thought, however we are experienced police officers and know that as with placing criminals in nice areas, putting well-educated happy children into a poorer environment does not improve performance of others, it merely pulls the good pupils down to a lower level.</p> <p>I feel so strongly regarding this matter that I am prepared to move to another area, but feel aggrieved that I may be forced to take such action. At a time when we all should be looking to improve the quality of the environment, this proposal will do untold damage and is contrary to the action we should be taking to safeguard the environment.

This is now in jeopardy. We strongly urge DBC to reconsider these proposals.

I understand that if the 'associated link' is removed my children will be offered a place at the closest school. This would be either Branksome or Longfield. I would like to know which one it will be. If Branksome, this causes a problem: All children have the right to, and should expect, an excellent standard of education. From reading its recent Ofsted report, Branksome does not offer such a standard. Has the Council performed a cost analysis to show that there will be overall savings made under your proposed changes? It is in no way fulfilling the Council's obligation to those children to waste a fantastic primary education at Heighington Academy by providing, in my opinion, an inadequate secondary one. I propose that the current system is left as it is. I also object to the limited consultation on this matter. The Town Crier did not mention associated transport and I suspect this was a deliberate omission. Parents have not been informed directly and there has been much unnecessary confusion amongst parents which the Council should, and could, have avoided.
23	Letter (circular)	09/01/2012	I would like to register my opposition to the proposed changes to the Local Authority's home school transport arrangements, as I believe that they discriminate disproportionately against parents on both religious and socio-economic grounds, neither do they give due regard to the safety of children. I am concerned that a judgement on what is regarded as having due regard for children's safety has the potential of being an arbitrary judgement based on a cost cutting exercise rather than adhering to paragraph 26 of the home to school transport guidance which states that....."personal safety should take account of perceptions of pupils, parents in relation to traffic speed on roads near schools, lack of safe crossing points, unlit footpaths, lack of cycle routes, bus routes that fail to pass within a reasonable distance of schools, the lack of affordable public transport options". My bus pass was a Godsend; I have difficulties using the buses but with determination and the help and consideration of other passengers I go out every day to town and I cannot overestimate the importance of that to me. I have people who can give me a lift when they see me at the weekend but normally I make five return journeys a week (I say 'normally' because I lost the use of my right foot about eight weeks ago but I hope to get back to my routine wearing a sort of leg brace). I go to the Dolphin Centre gym to help with my mobility supported by my DR. twice a week and I attend two AA meetings a week so four of those journeys are vital to my physical and mental health. Vital. I meet people at Age UK for lunch and social contact one day (I'm 53) , I usually just have coffee to save money, which is also important to me. While I am out I can 'mingle' and/or take a scooter out. I usually do my shopping on a Monday. Each return journey would cost me £2.80, six journeys £19.60 a week. Four of those six journeys are extremely important to my health and the other two are important to my independence and social contact, my feeling of belonging, being included. I simply cannot afford this. I struggle but I go to my hospital appointments on the bus, I don't book an ambulance or outpatients transport, I am not looking to have everything done for me, I am asking for help to help myself, help to just do what 'normal' people do under my own steam, in my own time. Is that too much to ask? My energy bills are over 12% of my income and I now have to pay someone to help me a little bit each week because of my foot and Shopmobility is at best going to be much dearer. I absolutely DREAD going back to the isolation I once knew. I was going to say 'my prison' but prisoners have company don't they? Can peoples' cases be evaluated to see how much they need a bus pass, how often they use it and then issued on merit? If it comes to no more free bus passes could Arriva be persuaded to let disabled people, the elderly etc buy a bus pass at GREATLY reduced prices---- no way can I afford anywhere near the £80 a month it would cost me at present. I was very impressed at DBC thoroughness and I know everyone will be up in arms but all I am asking for is help to be just like you.

Specialist Dimensions Transport gets me out of the house and I am feeling better. I am told that my transport will be stopped. I am not entirely certain of the reasons for the Council wanting to invest in the Civic Theatre at the expense of the Arts Centre, particularly as not so long ago the Arts Centre was refurbished. It does seem a little short sighted to have invested in the Arts Centre building if now we are being told that the high running costs do not give it a sustainable future. To get a clearer idea of how well used Council run facilities are it would be interesting to know the number of users and the comparator cost per user for the Arts Centre, Civic Theatre, Golf Club, Head of Steam, etc., to see what share of value people are getting in terms of the Council's investment in these individual facilities. One of the options proposed seems to focus on restricting future Arts provision to children & young people. This does not seem right - children should already have access to any number of arts facilities as part of their school education. Having said that, as school facilities are publicly funded, has there been any thought given to the potential for the wider public to benefit from use of facilities available in schools. It seems a waste that facilities (sports, IT, libraries, music) are limited to children and cannot be accessed by local people – particularly as schools may not be fully utilised on evenings and during school holidays. The Council is recommending the sale of the Arts Centre. Can you confirm what the Council expects will happen to the building should it be sold and what restrictions will be placed on any future buyer? Is the Arts Centre building a listed building? And also, what are the proposals in the interim if the Arts Centre is to close before a new facility is built? The recommended options for Arts provision seem to be based on a lot of uncertainties, i.e. future funding/ investment requirements. How can the Council make a decision when there is no certainty that the recommended option will be realised? What will be the contingency to ensure continued arts provision if funding cannot be secured and what commitment can be given that proceeds from any sale will be ring-fenced for the provision of Arts in Darlington town centre?

The comments from lots of people at this meeting was that the councillors on the front table they must have know that lots of people would be coming in wheelchair and disabled but everything that was put to the councillors was passed to someone else or they passed the buck not one question was given a TRUE FACT.

Statistics show that informal carers such as us save the country an estimated 119 billion pounds annually. In Darlington there are an estimated 10,000+ informal carers. Many struggle on regardless until they reach breaking point. Others, such as ourselves have received great benefit from being put in touch with our local carers organisation, DAD. They are a source of great help and information, as well as providing a listening ear when things get really tough. They have been able to signpost us to other services and have been able to provide some real practical help which has enabled us to get some relation therapy and to look after ourselves so we can continue in our role. Without such services people simply would not know where to turn.</p> <p>The informal caring would be likely to break down sooner rather than later, having an impact on the person cared for as well as on the local authority who may well be required to provide the care that was previously provided. Carers are an easy target but there are significant numbers of us. If we all stopped caring (which is very hard to do), then what would happen? Please think again. The service does not cost a lot to run but is invaluable to the many people who rely upon it.</p>
