## SCHOOL EXCLUSIONS 2007-08

## SUMMARY REPORT

## Purpose of the Report

1. The purpose of this report is to update members of the scrutiny as regards fixed term and permanent exclusions within Darlington for the academic year of September 2007 to July 2008.
2. To highlight progress in reducing exclusions and identify how this has been achieved.

## Summary

3. Exclusions, both fixed and permanent have dropped significantly during the last academic year. Schools have made significant improvements through the use of inclusion units, internal exclusion and isolation, implementing managed moves, individual student support and teacher coaching from the behaviour support team. They have worked closely in partnership with the Local Authority to implement positive alternatives to exclusion when appropriate.
4. The total number of permanent exclusions have fallen from 47 (06/07) to 23 (Appendix A). In secondary there have been 11 from LA maintained schools and 10 from Eastbourne C of E Academy. Primary schools had permanent 2 exclusions.
5. There has also been great improvement in both the number of days lost to fixed term exclusion and the number of individual students excluded. The number of days lost has dropped from 5101.5 to 2285 in secondary and to 209 from 297 in primary schools. The percentage of the pupil population excluded has also fallen from $10.84 \%$ to $5.91 \%$ in LA maintained secondary schools and from $30.25 \%$ to $16.49 \%$ at Eastbourne C of E Academy (Appendix A).

## MAIN REPORT

## Information and Analysis

7. The introduction of the $6^{\text {th }}$ day rule, requiring schools to provide full time education from the $6^{\text {th }}$ day of exclusion has led to a reduction in the number of fixed term exclusions over 6 days. Where fixed term exclusions have exceeded 6 days schools have supported one another through the partnership agreements.
8. $65.22 \%$ of all permanent exclusions in $07 / 08$ were for pupils in years 9 and 10 . In many cases this was the result of an extended period of escalating disruptive behaviour by students and can not be attributed to a single incident. It also demonstrates that as academic pressure on struggling students rises they often resort to poor behaviour as a defence. Identifying and monitoring students whose ongoing poor behaviour puts them at high risk of permanent exclusion and implementing appropriate behaviour support and respite programmes will aim to reduce these figures through earlier intervention. A higher number of exclusions in year 7 may be attributed to students struggling to successfully transfer into the secondary phase and highlights a need for increased support for those already demonstrating cause for concern during year 5 and 6 (This will be addressed by the commencement of the Turnaround provision in January 2009). Fixed term exclusions follow similar patterns of frequency (Appendix B).
9. The frequency of Permanent exclusions has dropped as the year had progressed with over $50 \%$ occurring in the Autumn term (Appendix C). This tailing off may be linked to the improved cooperation between Schools and the Local Authority, managed moves, access to alternative provisions and schools investing in strategies to reduce exclusion and increase support to higher risk students as the year has progressed.
10. The number of fixed term exclusions for pupils at some stage of SEN has dropped from 336 to 222 . This demonstrates greater efforts to provide appropriate provision and support student's specific needs. The greatest reduction is within the 'School Action' stage i.e. those identified as requiring and receiving extra support. This demonstrates the effectiveness of many of the interventions being used to help these students (Appendix D).
11. Fixed term exclusions occur for many reasons. Over $50 \%$ in $2007 / 8$ are attributed to 'Challenging Behaviour'. Thankfully figures relating to carrying offensive weapons, racism and drug related issues remain low despite national increases in such incidents.
12. Reasons for permanent exclusion generally are linked to challenging behaviour, often involving aggression, violence and verbal intimidation and abuse toward both staff and
other students. The majority of these cases result in permanent exclusion following an extended period of such behaviour which has escalated, despite schools having put numerous strategies in place. Increased earlier intervention including involvement from other agencies and alternatives such as managed moves, respite from the PRU and behaviour support will seek to reduce these figures further. The result being that permanent exclusion becomes a last resort. There have been few cases where permanent exclusion results from a single incident.
13. The appointment of two Specialist Behaviour Support Teaching Assistants assigned specifically to secondary schools has greatly increased the amount of specialist 1:1 student support available to schools for the coming academic year.
14. We have a newly appointed Inclusion Officer, with the role of working closely with schools, monitoring exclusions, identifying and supporting high risk students, providing a single contact regarding exclusion, support and the engagement of families, sharing good practice, working with schools and the PRU to find alternatives to exclusion, facilitating and negotiating managed moves when appropriate, attending governors exclusion meetings and giving governors training on exclusion. This role will build on the work already carried out by various individuals within the Local Authority and continue to develop close working with schools to further reduce exclusion and increase positive alternatives and outcomes for students.
