Child Abuse

Serious offences

Lifelong harm to victims




- CSE involves exploitative situations, contexts and relationships where young people (or a third person)
- receive 'something' (e.g. food, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes, affection, gifts, money)
- as a result of performing, and/or others performing on them, sexual activities.



What is the profile of child sexual exploitation in Durham &Darlington?






Findings



- Vulnerable victims with complex needs
- Live and/or socialising in deprived areas or high youth ASB hotspots
- Known perpetrators known for other aspects of criminality such as drug use, ASB and theft

Altogether Better Policing



Consent

- A child can never consent to their own abuse
- Consent never makes an illegal act legal



Alcohol



- Alcohol misuse
- Alcohol has been exchanged for sexual activity.
- Some victims and/or perpetrators of sexual assault were intoxicated
- No premises identified:
 - -intelligence gap or no concerns??





Where do perpetrators meet victims?

- Intelligence gap
- Residential locations teenagers hang out
- Parks, cemetery, town centre
- Online, mobile phone numbers shared



Inappropriate relationships

- Controlling exploitative relationships
- Alcohol/Drug use
- Victim reluctant to disclose



Street bases grooming



- Older Males befriend teenagers
- Consume alcohol
- Groom
- Sexual activity is exchanged for attention, alcohol, drugs, cigarettes
- Very intoxicated



Models



- Sexual activity exchanged for alcohol /drugs
- Street based grooming links to alcohol
- Inappropriate relationships with teens and older males
- Internet, social media, mobile phone



Perpetrator Profile



- Intelligence Gap
- Adult Males
 - Previous offending history
 - Antisocial behaviour/theft
 - Domestic abuse/violence
 - Street drinking/alcohol misuse
 - Drug use/ supply





- 2 crimes
- Historic reported as adult about stranger attack on child



Offender Profile

- Diverse in age
- 50 researched:
- Previously arrested for a sex offence or violent offence
- Domestic violence perpetrators



Victim Profile

- Diverse in age -3-44
- 90% female male under reporting
- Overrepresentation of socially deprived victims
- Previous victims of violence and/or sexual abuse
- Adults complex needs –alcohol/drugs
- Children risk taking behaviour/complex needs

Victim Profile

Recommendation: consider referral pathways and raising awareness with a range of agencies including mental health, alcohol/drug services/ youth offending teams



Summary

- CSE strong links to alcohol
- Associate and domestic Rape/Serious Sexual Assaults links to alcohol
- No problem premises identified lack of intelligence of no problem?



- Joint marketing work on-going
- Actions in Strategy include engaging with Taxi and Alcohol Industry to raise awareness
