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CHILDREN'S SERVICES PERFORMANCE IN 2005

Purpose of Report

1. To inform Members of the outcome from the Annual Performance Assessment of Darlington Borough Council's Education and Children's Social Care Services for 2005.

Information and Analysis

- 2. This year the Annual Performance Assessment (APA) of Children's Services was conducted jointly by the Commission for Social Care Inspection (CSCI) and the Office for Standards in Education (Ofsted). The purpose of the assessment is to evaluate the outcomes for children in the area and the contribution of Council services to those outcomes. The APA determines the Council's star rating for Children's Services and contributes to its social care star ratings for 2005 and the overall Corporate Performance Assessment rating.
- 3. In preparation for the APA the Authority was required to submit a self-assessment of the services it provides for education and children's social care. This assessment together with an APA data set formed the basis of a round table discussion between officers of the Council, CSCI and Ofsted during July 2005. On the basis of this discussion and following moderation at a national level the Council was issued in October 2005 with a letter setting-out an assessment of Council services for children and young people. This letter (a copy of which is enclosed at **Appendix 1**) highlights both areas of strength and areas for improvement and provides the final APA judgements for the Authority in 2005. APA judgements are ranked from 1 to 4. The final judgement scores for Darlington's Annual Performance Assessment are as follows:

4. The table below provides a descriptor for each score.

| Grade 4: A service that delivers well above minimum requirements for users | A service that delivers well above minimum requirements for children and young people, is innovative and cost–effective and fully contributes to raising expectations and the achievement of wider outcomes for the community. |
| Grade 3: A service that consistently delivers above minimum requirements for users | A service that consistently delivers above minimum requirements for children and young people, has some innovative practice and is increasingly cost-effective whilst making contributions to wider outcomes for the community. |
| Grade 2: A service that delivers only minimum requirements for users | A service that delivers minimum requirements for children and young people, but is not demonstrably cost-effective nor contributes significantly to wider outcomes for the community. |
| Grade 1: A service that does not deliver minimum requirements for users | A service that does not deliver minimum requirements for children and young people, is not cost-effective and makes little or no contribution to wider outcomes for the community. |

5. As referred to in paragraph 2 above the APA contributes to the Council's star rating for social care. The Council received notification of its social care ratings in November 2005 (letter attached as **Appendix 2**). This confirmed our social services performance rating as 2 stars. The letter breaks down the performance of social care services between adults and children. For children the Council is recognised as serving most people well and that it has excellent capacity for improvement. The final judgements secured for the APA for children's services and the overall 2 star rating for social services performance has contributed to the Authority maintaining its 'Excellent' status for Comprehensive Performance Assessment.

Outcome of Consultation

6. This report has been considered by the Social Affairs & Health Scrutiny Committee and the Lifelong Learning Scrutiny Committee.

Legal Implications

7. This report has been considered by the Borough Solicitor for legal implications in accordance with the Council's approved procedures. There are no issues which the Borough Solicitor considers need to be brought to the specific attention of Members, other than those highlighted in the report.
