SUMMARY REPORT

Purpose of the Report

1. To inform members of Scrutiny Committee of the publication of Darlington's NEET (not engaged in education, employment or training) Strategy.

Summary

- 2. Darlington has an established NEET Reduction Partnership. The role of the Partnership is to look strategically at the characteristics and barriers that prevent young people from engaging in learning and make recommendations regarding areas for development. The NEET Reduction Partnership reports to the 14 to 19 Trust which in turn reports to the Children's Trust.
- 3. The Partnership has commissioned the drafting of a NEET Strategy for Darlington.
- 4. The strategy was promoted at a 'launch event' on October 20th. An Executive Summary is being drafted for circulation to a wider audience.
- 5. The NEET Reduction Partnership has been successful in securing £647,812 of European Social Fund (ESF) monies to develop new learning programmes. The programmes are designed to engage young people outside of learning, at risk of disengaging or those who find learning difficult. The programme is called 'Skills4me'.
- 6. Over the coming year the Partnership will be monitoring delivery of the programme and identifying areas for future development.

Information and Analysis

- 8. Government have set a national NEET target to be achieved by 2010 and produced a national strategy to achieve this. Our Darlington NEET Strategy 'Everybody's Business, Everybody's Contribution', complements the national strategy.
- 9. Each Local Authority has been allocated a target as their contribution to the reduction of the national NEET figure.
- 10. Under the Local Area Agreement, Darlington has a stretched NEET Target to reach by 2010, with milestones to reach year on year. The progression towards the target is calculated using the average percentage of young people who are NEET each November, December and January each year
- 11. The chart below shows the 2010 target & milestones for preceding years. Darlington achieved 6.8% in January 2008.

12. It should be noted that the NEET population changes constantly. If we are to reduce the number of NEETs in Darlington we require the support of a range of partners and agencies.

- 13. The NEET Strategy has three main strands. Firstly prevention of young people becoming NEET. Secondly retention once young people are engaged and thirdly the sustainability of their job, training or education in the longer term.
- 14. We are confident that reducing the NEET figure is possible. The NEET Strategy will help to bring all stakeholders working with 14-19 year olds together so providing earlier intervention, targeted support and better sharing of information regarding young people at risk. Young people will receive better information, advice and guidance to meet their individual needs.
- 15. We are already making good progress. This year 99.8% of Darlington's Young People who left Secondary school in 2008 have been offered a place in training, education or employment.
- 16. The next stage is to ensure that the offer of a place for every school leaver is converted into actual starts in training, education or employment.
- 17. Reaching the local authority's stretched NEET Target in 2010 will release £233,475 of Government funding to the authority under the Local Area Agreement.

Outcome of Consultation

18.	The NEET Strategy is the outcome of wide consultation with stakeholders involved with
	those considered NEET or at risk of becoming NEET in Darlington.
