CYP25 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest reported at this meeting.

CYP26 MINUTES

Submitted – The Minutes (previously circulated) of the meeting of this Scrutiny Committee held on 4 January 2021.

With reference to Item CYP19/Jan/21 Members agreed to amend the resolution in respect of (a).

RESOLVED – That the Minutes of the meeting of this Scrutiny Committee held on 4 January 2021 be approved as a correct record with the exception of Minute CYP19/Jan/21, resolution (a) to be amended to read:

(a) That this Scrutiny Committee has no comment to make on the proposed schedule of fees and charges for those services within its remit (as there are none) and supports the Children's Services budget allocation recommendations contained within the Revenue Estimates 2021/22 section of the draft Medium Term Financial Plan.

CYP27 PRESENTATION ON THE DARLINGTON MIND CHILDREN IN NEED SELF-HARM PROJECT

Ian Neale, Darlington Mind Young Persons Co-ordinator gave an update on the Children in Need Self-Harm Project and the work of Darlington Mind in supporting young people in all mental health issues and Members advised that young people were worried about Covid-19 and returning to school on 8 March and were generally

struggling with their mental health.

It was reported that there were currently two counsellors offering help to young people and lan advised Members that they can signpost young people for counselling to him upon completion of a referral form with a view to offering the young person the support they require. This service is available to young people aged 11-18 years and referrals were usually made from schools, parents or self-referral.

Discussion ensued on how to encourage more young people to take up mentoring roles and future plans to have peer mentors within schools. Members also referred to other organisations ie. the Listening Post who are also working with young people's mental health issues.

RESOLVED – That Ian be thanked for his interesting and informative update.

CYP28 DEVELOPMENT OF THE DARLINGTON CARE COLLECTIVE

The Director of Children and Adult Services submitted a report (previously circulated) to provide an outline and overview of the Developing Darlington Care Collective (DDCC), including aims and objectives of the group.

It was reported that the concept of a 'Care Collective' followed on from the National Social Care Recruitment Campaign ("We need you now, they need you always") and was initially discussed during the first Covid-19 pandemic lockdown.

The rationale included providing support to the Care Sector in response to Covid-19, particularly in terms of low-level role capacity and need, supporting mental health and resilience, whilst creating opportunities to develop partnerships and multi-agency working across the health, social care and education sector in Darlington.

It was also reported that a number of priorities had been discussed with cross sector partners across the borough including support for the development of capacity across the Children and Adults Care Sector, particularly Care Homes and Children's Residential Care, should a second wave of Covid19 manifest and to promote good mental health and make every contact count (MECC); the Workforce Development Team had linked with key partners from across the borough to gauge appetite in supporting and being part of the DDCC; and a number of key questions were identified and answered in the initial DDCC Steering Group Meetings.

Martin Webster, Workforce Development Manager outlined the four key focus priorities of the Darlington Care Collective; ways to support the Adult Care Home Sector and Children's Residential Services and support across the board for those working with people; how the Collective were looking at ways to develop volunteering, training and employment opportunities through multi-agency working bringing together 50 key partners from across the Borough, including the Council, Care Homes, Health partners, the Police, Children's residential homes, colleges, universities and the voluntary sector; and the key drivers around supporting the sector in terms of bodes and designing consistent and sustainable models of training to link people into opportunities including access to Work Force Capacity Funding.

The submitted report also outlined specific headline plans for the DDCC in 2021 and

all DDCC partners have agreed to co-produce a shared project plan for 2021 onwards.

Members questions related to apprenticeship schemes and access to funding; support for employment opportunities and getting people engaged into the process and progression of social work.

RESOLVED – (a) That the submitted report be noted in terms of the DDCC progressing and supporting Social Care succession planning and partnership development.

(b) That MECC (Making Every Contact Count) is considered as an informal local area approach to convey health related information to residents.

CYP29 PROGRESS UPDATE ON DIGITAL INCLUSION

Following a request by the Chair, Tony Murphy Head of Education and Inclusion provided Members with a verbal update regarding digital inclusion.

He advised Members that there had been approximately 3,600 devices issued to schools and Academy Trusts up to February to focus on disadvantaged children and the number of devices available to each school was based on the Department for Education (DfE) estimates.

He also advised that school leaders were learning from families that because remote learning had developed throughout the pandemic and a higher degree of formal learning had been developed, the limited number of devices in households was creating problems and detailed allocation and distribution data had been requested from the DfE so that the authority can support schools in the best way.


It was also reported that the Education Strategy Group meet weekly with the DfE to examine the level of need and also to identify any other barriers to learning.

Discussion ensued on the varied home learning experiences within families; the mental health impact on parents and in particular single parents; the barriers to accessing learning for some families who have multiple people trying to access remotely; access issues especially in rural areas; and the access to quiet space which is limited in some households. Members acknowledged that despite schools returning on 8 March this was an issue to remain at the top of this Scrutiny Committee's agenda.

RESOLVED – That the verbal update be noted.

The Managing Director submitted a report (previously circulated) requesting that consideration be given to this Scrutiny Committee's work programme and to consider any additional areas which Members suggest should be included in the approved work programme.

PERFORMANCE INDICATORS Q3 2020/21

Purpose of the Report

1. To provide Members with an update on performance against key performance indicators.

Summary

- 2. This report provides Quarter 3 (October December) 2020/21 performance information in line with an indicator set agreed by Monitoring and Coordination Group on 2 July 2018, and subsequently by Scrutiny Committee Chairs.
- 3. It is suggested monitoring focuses on issues and exceptions, and relevant Assistant Directors will attend the meeting to respond to queries raised by the committee regarding the performance information contained within this report.
- 4. Where indicators are reported annually, quarterly updates will not be available.

Where are we performing well?

- 5. 92.5% of Initial Child Protection Conferences (ICPC) were held within 15 working days of the Strategy meeting being held / section 47 being initiated, which remains higher than our statistical neighbour, regional and national average benchmarks.
- 6. 100% of children with a Child Protection (CP) plan, and 100% of Children in Care (CiC) have an allocated social worker.
- 7. Year to date no child has ceased to be subject to a CP plan who had been subject to the plan for 2 or more years, we continue to positively perform below our targets of 5%.
- 8. 85.8% of children received a statutory CP visit within 10 working days in Q3. This is in line with the target of 90% and an improvement on the timeliness of visits when compared with the same period last year (77.7%).
- 9. 93.4% of statutory CiC visits were completed within timescale year to date. This is above the target of 90% and an improvement on the timeliness of visits when compared with the same period last year (88.2%).
- 10. 6.7% of Children in Care (CiC), as at December 2020, have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months. This performance is better than the internal target (10%), national (10%), statistical neighbour (9.9%) and regional averages (10%) and an improvement on the 10.7% as at December 2019.
- 11. 7.4% of our Children in Care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at December 2020. This is a positive performance and below target of 10%.

- 12. 100% of the children, newly into care, were seen by CDDFT within 20 working days for an initial health assessment during Q3 2020/21.
- 13. 91.7% of children due a review health assessment year to date had one completed.
- 14. 26.5% of Care Leavers were not in employment, education or training (NEET) which is positivity below target of 30% and 98.0% were in suitable accommodation.

Where do we need to improve?

- 15. 75.6% of referrals were screened and completed within 1 day during Q3 2020/21 giving us a year to date performance of 77.7%, below the target of 90%.
- 16. 19.7% of re-referrals year to date, were repeated within 12 months, above the target of 18%. However, this has continued to decrease over the year.
- 17. Timeliness of assessments is 85.2% which is below the target of 90%, reasons for this are analysed and monitored by the Head of Service.
- 18. At the end of December 2020, the percentage of children becoming subject to a CP plan for a second or subsequent time within 2 years of the previous plan ending was 8.3%, above the 6% target.
- 19. The number of Children in Care has decreased to 284 by the end of December 2020, in line with the number at the end of December 2019 (280), work continues to safely reduce the number of children becoming looked after.
- 20. As a result of dental surgery closures during lockdown, 29.5% of Children in Care, that were due a dental check assessment, have had one completed.

Quarter 3 2020/21 Performance Summary

Referral: 75.6% of referrals have been completed within 1 working day during Q3 2020/21, with a year to date total of 77.7%. Extensive work regarding referral enquiries has been required for some cases, resulting in completion taking longer that the statutory timescale. However, the additional work has been to the benefit of the child.

Re-Referrals: 19.7% of children have been re-referred to Children's Social Care within 12 months of a previous referral. This is above the internal target of 18%, but below our statistical neighbour (20.8%), regional (22.4%) and national average (22.6%) (LAIT 2020).

Early Help: 170 Early Help Assessments have been completed during Q3 2020/21.

Missing: Of the children and young people who are reported missing from home, 85.1% have been offered a return home interview within the 72-hour timescale. Where the co-ordinator cannot engage the child or young person, discussion takes place with parents, carers, teachers or social workers to offer insight around reducing the missing episodes. Of those who went missing 23.8% were a Child in Care.

Children & Families Assessments: 203 children had a single assessment carried out during Q3 2020/21, which is comparable to the 204 assessments completed during the same period last year. The rate of assessments was 237.8 per 10,000 of the population at the end of December 2020.

C&F Timeliness: Social workers completed 85.2% of the C&F assessments within timescale year to date. This is below our target of 90%, statistical neighbour (87.7%) and regional average (88.8%) and above national average (83.8%) as recorded for 2020 in the LAIT.

Section 47 enquiries: 44 section 47 enquires were started during Q3 2019/20 involving 76 children, 2 of which were subject to a Child Protection plan (CP) at the time of the enquiry.

Child Protection Conference Timeliness: Year to date 92.5% of Initial Child Protection Conferences (ICPC) were held within 15 working days from the strategy meeting / section 47 being initiated, excluding transfer-in conferences, against our target of 95%. Darlington's performance remains higher than our statistical neighbour (80.8%), regional (83.1%) and national average (77.6%) (LAIT 2020).

Child Protection Plans: 88 children were subject to a Child Protection plan (CP) as at the end of December 2020. This is slightly below the 91 children who were subject to CP at the end of December 2019. Darlington currently has a rate of 39.2 per 10,000 population for children subject to a CPP which is lower that the regional average (70.0), statistical neighbour (53.9) and the national average (42.8) as reported in the 2020 LAIT.

100.0% of CP cases were allocated to a social worker and all the CP reviews were carried out in timescale. During Q3 2020/21 there were no children ceasing CP who had been subject to the plan for 2 or more years. At the end of December 2020, the percentage of children becoming subject to a CP plan for a second or subsequent time within 2 years of the previous plan ending was 8.3%, above the 6% target.

Child Protection Statutory visits: 85.8% of children received a statutory Child Protection (CP) visit in Q3 2020/21 within 10 working days, this is below target of 90% but an increase on the 77.7% that was completed in this timescale in Q3 2019/20.

Children in Care: 284 children are currently in care as at December 2020, which is a slight increase on the number of children (280) that were in care as at December 2019. During Q3 2020/21 a total of 13 children came into the care of the Local Authority, which is lower than in Q3 2019/20 (18). During Q3 2020/21, 31 children ceased to be in care. This demonstrates the curve in respect of the number of CiC is moving in the right direction.

Children in Care Reviews: 100.0% of Children in Care (CiC) were allocated to a qualified social worker. All reviews, except for 1, have been completed within required timescales during Q3 2020/21.

Statutory visits of Children in Care: During Q3 2020/21, 93.9% of statutory visits for Children in Care (CiC) were completed in timescale, this is an improvement compared to Q3 2019/20 when there were 89.7% visits completed in timescale. Year to date 93.4% of CiC visits have been completed in timescale which is above the target of 90%.

Children in Care Placements: 6.7% of Children in Care (CiC), as at December 2020, have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months. This is positively below the internal target (10%), national (10%), statistical neighbour (9.9%) and regional averages (10%) as recorded in the LAIT 2020, and below the 10.7% as at December 2019.

76.1% of our Children in Care aged under 16 (who have been looked after for at least 2.5 years) have been in their current placement continuously for at least 2 years. This is a higher percentage compared with December 2019 (72.7%) and is positively above the 68% target.

7.4% of our Children in Care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at December 2020, which is a positive reduction when compared to December 2019 (10.3%) and below internal target (10%). This relates to young people who have been placed in residential care due to their disability / placed with family / or placed for adoption, and this provision was not available within 20 miles.

Initial Health Assessments: 100.0% of the children, newly into care, were seen by CDDFT within 20 working days for an initial health assessment during Q3 2020/21.

Health and Dental Reviews: 91.7% of children due a review health assessment by December 2020 have had one completed. This percentage has increased slightly compared with 90.4% completed reviews at the end of December 2019.

As a result of dental surgery closures during lockdown, 29.5% of Children in Care, that were due a dental check assessment has had one completed.

The percentage of children who have refused their medical checks has continued to decrease, with only 4.5% refusing their health review and 3.2% refusing their dental review. Although they are refusing, they are continually reminded of the benefits of having a check-up and encouraged to take part.

Care Leavers: 100.0% of care leavers were in suitable accommodation at the end of Q3 2020/21.

The percentage of care leavers who were Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET) continues to be positively below the target set of 30% at 26.5% at the end of Q3 2020/21.

REFERRALS - TIMELINESS

DEFINITION

Percentage of referrals completed within 1 working day and over 3 working days. Referrals completed within 1 working day indicates that decisions regarding the services required are made in a timely manner to minimise drift and delay and to ensure that children are safe.

RFORMANC ANALYSIS 75.6% of the referrals completed within timescale during Q3 2020/21.

We have experienced a rise in referrals taking longer than 3 working days to complete, currently just below the 5% target with 4.2%. However, consideration is needed regarding the number of siblings in these families. 3 families with 3 children during Q3 2019/20 compared to 4 families with 12 children during Q3 2020/21 had their referral outcomed over timescale resulting in the increased percentage out of time.



REFERRALS - RE-REFERRALS


DEFINITION

Percentage of re-referrals that are received within 12 months of a previous referral (based on referral start dates)

A re-referral to Children's Social Care could be an indication that the previous referral was inappropriately closed down without addressing the initial concerns or issues.

ERFORMANC

30 re-referrals from 12 families have been made during Q3 2020/21. This has resulted in 19.7% of our referrals year to date being repeated within 12 months. This is above the internal target of 18%, but below our statistical neighbour (20.8%), regional (22.4%) and national average (22.6%) (LAIT 2020). The number of children being re-referred is also below the number in Q3 2019/20, which saw 43 children from 23 families being re-referred.



ARLY HELP ASSESSMENTS - STARTED

DEFINITION

The number of individual Early Help Assessments (EHA) started in month and year to date, including those initiated by external agencies. The start date of the EHA is taken from the form created date in Liquid Logic and the start date of the external EHA is taken from the contact date when the agency informed us of the EHA.

170 Early Help Assessments (EHA) were started during Q3 2020/21.



ERFORMANCE ANALYS

16 Children in Care (CiC) were reported missing in Q3 2020/21. Where children are looked after by other authorities but cared for in Darlington, the ERASE Team have been alerted and provided with relevant information to ensure that the young people have been appropriately placed.



ASSESSMENTS - TIMELINESS

DEFINITION

Of those assessments completed in a period, the percentage completed within 45 working days. Day zero is the first working day on or after the start date of the referral, or strategy discussion decided to initiate S47 enquiries, or where new information indicates that an assessment should be undertaken. The end date is the first working day on or after the recorded date the Team Manager closes the single assessment. A process indicator as a proxy measure for improved child safety and how quickly services can respond when a child is thought to be at risk of serious harm. Local authorities should investigate and address concerns in a timely and efficient way.

PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS

As at December 2020, 85.2% (455 / 534) of the C&F assessments were completed within 45 days.

This is below our target of 90%, statistical neighbour (87.7%) and regional average (88.8%) and above national average (83.8%) as recorded for 2020 in the LAIT.




ERFORMANG

Of the 22 children (who were not transferred in), 21 had their Initial Child Protection Conferences (ICPC) within timescale (95.5%) during Q3 2020/21. 1 child did not receive their conference in time during October 2020 and went on to have a CP plan as the outcome.

Although the delayed conferences have taken us slightly below our target of 95%, our performance remains higher than our statistical neighbour (80.8%), regional (83.1%) and national average (77.6%) (LAIT 2020).



Performance remains higher than statistical neighbours (89.9%), regional (92.9%) and national averages (91.5%) as reported in the 2020 LAIT.



The rate of Children in Care (CiC) per 10,000 population is currently 126.5 which is higher than our statistical neighbours (100.3), regional (108.0) and national average (67.0) (LAIT 2020).



CHILDREN IN CARE - ALLOCATION & REVIEWS

DEFINITION

The percentage of Children in Care cases which should have been reviewed during the year ending 31 March that were reviewed on time during the year and the percentage of Children in Care cases that were allocated to a qualified Social Worker at the end of the month.

To improve compliance with local authorities' legal requirements under the Review of Children's cases Regulations 1991. The purpose of the review is to consider the plan for the child's welfare, to monitor the progress of the plan and amend it as necessary in light of changed information and circumstances. The statutory intervals are within 20 working days of placement, then within 3 months and 6 monthly thereafter, but reviews may be rescheduled or held inside these intervals if there are significant changes to the child's care plan.

100.0% of Children in Care (CiC) are allocated to a qualified social worker.



PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS

During Q3 2020/21, 93.9% of statutory visits for Children in Care (CiC) were completed in timescale, this is an improvement compared to Q3 2019/20 when there were 89.7% visits completed in timescale.



CHILDREN IN CARE - PLACEMENTS

Of those Children in Care at the point in time (excluding series of short-term placements), the percentage that had 3 or more separate placements in the previous 12 months; who had been in their current placement for 2 or more years, and who were placed more than 20 miles away from their home address.


On the whole stability is associated with better outcomes; placement instability has been highlighted as a key barrier to improving educational outcomes. Proper assessment and an adequate choice of placements to meet the varied needs of different children are essential if appropriate stable placements are to be made. Inappropriate placements often break down and lead to frequent moves. Nevertheless, the circumstances of some individual children will require 3 or more separate placements during a year if they and others are to be kept safe.

NCE ANALY

6.7% of Children in Care, as at December 2020, have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months. This is positively below the internal target (10%), national (10), statistical neighbour (9.9) and regional averages (10) as recorded in the LAIT 2020, and below the 10.7% as at December 2019.

Currently, 76.1% of our Children in Care aged under 16 (who have been looked after for at least 2.5 years) have been in their current placement continuously for at least 2 years. This is a higher percentage compared with December 2019 (72.7%) and is positively above the 68% target.

7.4% (20 children) of our Children in Care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at December 2020. This is positively below target of 10%.



Children in Care share many of the same health risks and problems as their peers, but often to a greater degree. These indicators track the participation of our Children in Care's health as a proxy for monitoring the general health and wellbeing of the children, as well as providing a check on the effectiveness of joint working with Health to secure good health outcomes for Children in Care.

91.1% of children due a review health assessment by December 2020 have had one completed. This percentage is above December 2019 (90.4%) and is an accomplishment when considering the restraints the pandemic has had on access to health organisations.

4.5% of the children due a review are refusing to have one completed at this time. Although they are refusing, they are continually reminded of the benefits of having a check-up and encouraged to take part.





CSC 250: % of CiC who are up to date for a Review Health Check at 31st March





CHILDREN IN CARE - DENTAL HEALTH ASSESSMENTS


DEFINITION

Of the Children in Care (CiC) at 31 March who had been in care continuously for at least 12 months, the percentage who had had their teeth checked by a dentist during the previous 12 months, and the percentage who had had an annual health check during the previous 12 months.

Children in Care share many of the same health risks and problems as their peers, but often to a greater degree. These indicators track the participation of our Children in Care with dental checks as a proxy for monitoring the general health and wellbeing of the children, as well as providing a check on the effectiveness of joint working with Health to secure good health outcomes for Children in Care.

ERFORIMANG ANALYSIS 29.5% of children due a dental check assessment by December 2020 have had one completed. This is lower than the 85.8% of CiC who were up to date with their assessments by December 2019, however NHS dental practises have been closed for a considerable length of time during the pandemic and when opened, were only admitting emergency cases.

3.2% of the children due a dental check are refusing to have one completed at this time. Although they are refusing, they are continually reminded of the benefits of having a check-up and encouraged to take part.



CARE LEAVERS

DEFINITION

The percentage of 'former relevant' care leavers aged 19-21 who were in suitable accommodation at their most recent contact, and the percentage who were not in employment, education or training at their most recent contact. Published data is included for comparison however data submitted to DfE by Local Authorities captures the young person's status around their 19th, 20th, or 21st birthday each year rather than the latest available information.

This measures accommodation and employment outcomes for young people formerly in care - a key group at risk of social exclusion. It is intended to increase the proportion of former care leavers who are in suitable accommodation and employment, education or training.


CE ANALYS

98.0% of our care leavers were in suitable accommodation at the end of December 2020. This is above target of 95%. The 2.0% of care leavers in unsuitable accommodation is due to young people being recalled to custody during this quarter.

Of the young people (aged 19-21) as at December 2020 who were Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET):

- 10.2% NEET because of illness or disability
- 6.1% NEET because of other circumstances
- 10.2% NEET because of pregnancy or parenting.

This equates to 26.5% of our care leavers which is below internal target of 30% NEET.


