CYP32 TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THIS SCRUTINY COMMITTEE HELD ON 1 MARCH 2021

CYP33 HRH PRINCE PHILIP, DUKE OF EDINBURGH

The Chair and Members held a moment of reflection for HRH Prince Philip and acknowledged his work with children and young people and in particular with the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

CYP34 PERFORMANCE INDICATORS QUARTER 3 2020/21

The Director of Children and Adults Services submitted a report (previously circulated) to provide Members with an update on performance against key performance indicators.

The submitted report provided Quarter 3 (October to December) 2020/21 performance information in line with an indicator set agreed by the Monitoring and Co-ordination Group and subsequently by each individual Scrutiny Committee.

The submitted report highlighted where Children and Young People Services were performing well and where there was a need to improve. It was also outlined that where indicators are reported annually, quarterly updates will not be available.

It was highlighted that 92.5 per cent of Initial Child Protection Conferences (ICPC) were held within 15 working days of the Strategy meeting being held / section 47 being initiated, which remains higher than our statistical neighbour, regional and national average benchmarks; 100 per cent of children with a Child Protection (CP) plan and 100 per cent of Children in Care (CiC) have an allocated social worker; year to date no child has ceased to be subject to a CP plan who had been subject to the plan for 2 or more years and continue to positively perform below our targets of 5 per cent; 85.8 per cent of children received a statutory CP visit within 10 working days in Quarter 3; 93.4 per cent of statutory CiC visits were completed within timescale year to date above the target of 90 per cent and an improvement on the timeliness of visits when compared with the same period last year (88.2 per cent); 6.7 per cent of Children in Care (CiC), as at December 2020, have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months whic is better than the internal target, national, regional averages (all at 10 per cent) and statistical neighbour (9.9 per cent) which was an improvement on 10.7 per cent as at December 2019; 7.4 per cemt of our Children in Care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at December 2020; 100 per cent of the children, newly into care, were seen by CDDFT within 20 working days for an initial health assessment during Quarter 3 2020/21; 91.7 per cent of children due a review health assessment year to date had one completed; and 26.5 per cent of Care Leavers were not in employment, education or training (NEET) which is positivity below target of 30 per cent and 98.0 per cent were in suitable accommodation.

The areas highlighted for focus were in respect of referrals screened and completed within 1 day which was 75.6 per cent during Q3 2020/21 giving a year to date performance of 77.7 per cent, below the target of 90 per cent; 19.7 per cent of rereferrals year to date, were repeated within 12 months, above the target of 18 per cent; timeliness of assessments was 85.2 per cent, below the target of 90 per cent; at the end of December 2020, the percentage of children becoming subject to a Child Protection plan for a second or subsequent time within 2 years of the previous plan ending was 8.3 per cent, above the 6 per cent target; the number of Children in Care had decreased to 284 by the end of December 2020, in line with the number at the end of December 2019 (280) and work continues to safely reduce the number of children becoming looked after; and as a result of dental surgery closures during lockdown, 29.5 per cent of Children in Care, that were due a dental check assessment, have had one completed.

Members discussed in particular the percentage of referrals completed within one working day and the rise in those taking over 3 working days and questioned what procedures were in place to expedite this; the percentage of re-referrals that are received within 12 months of a previous referral and what has been done to address this area; regarding the number of children and families assessments completed and if there were any emerging themes; a Member questioned if officers were expecting any change in the number of Child Protection Plans coming out of lockdown and the reasons why this authority was below the regional statistics for Child Protection Plans; and discussed the number of children in care with three or more separate placements which had reduced however Members felt still required constant monitoring.

Members also acknowledged the work that had been undertaken to ensure that the number of initial health assessments completed within 20 working days was 100 per

cent; however they questioned what the authority intended to do to encourage the number of children in care to have an annual dental check; and Members requested further information on the number of agency social workers the authority employed; and the approximate ratio of Looked after children placed from outside the authority in Darlington.

RESOLVED – That the performance information reported for Quarter 3 2020/21 be noted.

CYP35 WORK PROGRAMME

The final report outlined the findings and recommendations of the Review Group established by this Scrutiny Committee at the meeting held on 4 January 2021.

The aim of the review was to examine the current picture, identify good practice and if there are any gaps in service; and to make suggestions or recommendations to the Health and Wellbeing Board, the Darlington Cares Board and/or Cabinet.

Members discussed the report and recommendations and Councillor Crudass presented a number of additional comments and recommendations to be included in the report. Members confirmed that as this was an important piece of work they wanted to ensure that a unanimous decision could be made on the final report, therefore agreed to refer the final report back to the Review Group to re-consider the final report and the additions presented by Councillor Crudass.

RESOLED – That no decision be made on the final report and that it be referred back to the Review Group for further discussion and be presented to a Special meeting of this Scrutiny for approval.

PERFORMANCE INDICATORS 2020/21

Purpose of the Report

1. To provide Members with an update on performance against key performance indicators.

Summary

- 2. This report provides year end performance information (April 2020 March 2021) in line with an indicator set agreed by Monitoring and Coordination Group on 2 July 2018, and subsequently by Scrutiny Committee Chairs.
- 3. It is suggested monitoring focuses on issues and exceptions, and relevant Assistant Directors will attend the meeting to respond to queries raised by the committee regarding the performance information contained within this report.
- 4. Where indicators are reported annually, quarterly updates will not be available.

Where are we performing well?

- 5. 94.4% of Initial Child Protection Conferences (ICPC) were held within 15 working days of the Strategy meeting being held / Section 47 being initiated, which remains higher than our statistical neighbour, regional and national average benchmarks.
- 6. 100% of children with a Child Protection (CP) plan, and 100% of Children in Care (CiC) have an allocated social worker.
- 7. During 2020/21 no child has ceased to be subject to a CP plan who had been subject to the plan for 2 or more years, we continue to positively perform below our target of 5%.
- 8. 89.0% of children received a statutory CP visit within 10 working days during 2020/21. This is in line with the target of 90%.
- 9. 93.1% of statutory CiC visits were completed within timescale during 2020/21. This is above the target of 90% and an improvement on the timeliness of visits when compared with the same period last year (89.0%).
- 10. 8.1% of Children in Care (CiC), as at March 2021, have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months. This performance is better than the internal target (10%), national (10%), statistical neighbour (9.9%) and regional averages (10%) as recorded in the LAIT 2020.
- 11. 71.9% of our Children in Care aged under 16 (who have been looked after for at least 2.5 years) have been in their current placement continuously for at least 2 years. This is

- positively above our target of 68.0% and our statistical neighbours (69.3%), regional (69.0%) and national average (68.0%).
- 12. 9.4% of our Children in Care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at March 2021. This is a positive performance and below target of 10%.
- 13. 90.9% of the children, newly into care, were seen by CDDFT within 20 working days for an initial health assessment during 2020/21.
- 14. 91.2% of children due a review health assessment year to date had one completed.
- 15. 24.6% of Care Leavers were not in employment, education or training (NEET) which is positivity below target of 30% and 98.1% were in suitable accommodation.

Where do we need to improve?

- 16. 77.7% of referrals were screened and completed within 1 day during 2020/21, below the target of 90%.
- 17. 19.1% of re-referrals year to date, were repeated within 12 months, above the target of 18%. This is a smaller cohort of children re-referred when comparing with 2019/20, but due to the decrease in referrals this has increased our percentage rate.
- 18. Timeliness of assessments is 86.4% which is below the target of 90%, reasons for this are analysed and monitored by the Head of Service.
- 19. At the end of March 2021, the percentage of children becoming subject to a CP plan for a second or subsequent time within 2 years of the previous plan ending was 9.4%, above the 6% target.
- 20. The number of Children in Care has decreased to 272 by the end of March 2021, in line with the number at the end of March 2020 (270), work continues to safely reduce the number of children becoming looked after.
- 21. As a result of dental surgery closures during national lockdowns, 57.2% of Children in Care, that were due a dental check assessment, have had one completed.

2020/21 Performance Summary

Referral: 77.7% of referrals received during 2020/21 were completed within 1 working day and 4.7% took over 3 working days to complete. Extensive work regarding referral enquiries has been required for some cases, resulting in completion taking longer that the statutory timescale. However, the additional work has been to the benefit of the child.

Re-Referrals: 19.1% of the children have been re-referred to Children's Social Care within 12 months of a previous referral. This is above the internal target of 18%, but below our statistical neighbour (20.8%), regional (22.4%) and national average (22.6%) (LAIT 2020).

Early Help: 623 Early Help Assessments have been completed during 2020/21.

Missing: Of the children and young people who are reported missing from home, 87.5% have been offered a return home interview within the 72-hour timescale. Where the co-ordinator cannot engage the child or young person, discussion takes place with parents, carers, teachers or social workers to offer insight around reducing the missing episodes. Of those who went missing 19.7% were a Child in Care.

Children & Families Assessments: 692 children had a single assessment carried out during 2020/21 with a rate of assessments as 308.2 per 10,000 of the population at the end of March 2021.

C&F Timeliness: Social workers completed 86.4% of the C&F assessments within timescale during 2020/21. This is in line with our statistical neighbour (87.7%) and regional average (88.8%) and above the national average (83.1%) as recorded for 2020 in the LAIT, but below our target of 90%.

Section 47 enquiries: 197 section 47 enquires were started during 2020/21 involving 361 children, 7 of which were subject to a Child Protection plan (CP) at the time of the enquiry.

Child Protection Conference Timeliness: 94.4% of Initial Child Protection Conferences (ICPC) were held within 15 working days from the strategy meeting / section 47 being initiated, excluding transfer-in conferences, during 2020/21. Darlington's performance remains higher than our statistical neighbour (80.8%), regional (83.1%) and national average (77.6%) (LAIT 2020) and in line with internal target of 95%.

Child Protection Plans: 87 children were subject to a Child Protection plan (CP) as at the end of March 2021. This is comparable to the 85 children open to a plan at the end of March 2020. Darlington's rate equated to 38.8 per 10,000 population for children subject to a CPP which is lower that the regional average (70.0), statistical neighbour (53.9) and the national average (42.8) as reported in the 2020 LAIT.

100.0% of CP cases were allocated to a social worker and all the CP reviews were carried out in timescale. During 2020/21 there were no children ceasing CP who had been subject to the plan for 2 or more years. At the end of March 2021, the percentage of children becoming subject to a CP plan for a second or subsequent time within 2 years of the previous plan ending was 9.4%, above the 6% target.

Child Protection Statutory visits: 89.0% of children received a statutory Child Protection (CP) visit in 2020/21 within 10 working days, this is in line with our target of 90%.

Children in Care: 272 children are currently in care as at March 2021, which is comparable to the number of children (270) that were in care as at March 2020. During 2020/21 a total of 82 children came into the care of the Local Authority, which is lower than in 2019/20 (109). During 2020/21, 80 children ceased to be in care.

Children in Care Reviews: 100.0% of Children in Care (CiC) were allocated to a qualified social worker. 99.6% of the reviews have been completed within required timescales during 2020/21.

Children in Care Statutory visits: 93.1% of statutory visits for Children in Care (CiC) were completed in timescale during 2020/21. This is an improvement proposed to 2019/20 when there were 89.0% visits completed in timescale and above our internal target of 90%.

Children in Care Placements: 8.1% of Children in Care (CiC), as at March 2021, have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months. This is positively below the internal target (10%), national (10%), statistical neighbour (9.9%) and regional averages (10%) as recorded in the LAIT 2020. 71.9% of our Children in Care aged under 16 (who have been looked after for at least 2.5 years) have been in their current placement continuously for at least 2 years. This is positively above our target of 68.0% and our statistical neighbours (69.3%), regional (69.0%) and national average (68.0%). 9.4% of our Children in Care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at March 2021, which is similar to that at March 2020 (9.6%) and below our target of 10.0%. This relates to young people who have been placed in residential care due to their disability / placed with family / or placed for adoption, and this provision was not available within 20 miles.

Initial Health Assessments: 90.9% of the children, newly into care, were seen by CDDFT within 20 working days for an initial health assessment during 2020/21.

Health and Dental Reviews: 91.2% of children due a review health assessment by March 2021 have had one completed. This percentage is comparable to the end of 2019/20 (93.3%) and is above our 90% target.

As a result of dental surgery closures during national lockdowns, 57.2% of Children in Care, that were due a dental check assessment has had one completed. The percentage of children who have refused their medical checks has continued to decrease through the year, with 3.7% refusing their health review and 2.8% refusing their dental review. Although they are refusing, they are continually reminded of the benefits of having a check-up and encouraged to take part.

Care Leavers: 98.1% of care leavers were in suitable accommodation at the end of March 2021. The 1.9% of care leavers in unsuitable accommodation was due to being in custody. This is above our target of 95%.

The percentage of care leavers who were Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET) continues to be positively below the target set of 30% at 24.6% at the end of March 2021.

REFERRALS - TIMELINESS


DEFINITION

Percentage of referrals completed within 1 working day and over 3 working days. Referrals completed within 1 working day indicates that decisions regarding the services required are made in a timely manner to minimise drift and delay and to ensure that children are safe.

PERFORMANCE ANALYSI

77.7% of referrals were completed within 1 working day during 2020/21 and 4.7% of the referrals took over 3 working days to complete.

All referrals that are not completed in timescale are reviewed each month by Team Managers. It has been noted that the majority of the delays have been a result of waiting for further information from third parties to make an informed decision or difficulties in contacting the families. All delays were confirmed being required and in the best interest of the family and children.



REFERRALS - RE-REFERRALS

DEFINITION

Percentage of re-referrals that are received within 12 months of a previous referral (based on referral start dates)
A re-referral to Children's Social Care could be an indication that the previous referral was inappropriately closed down without addressing the initial concerns or issues.

PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS 143 re-referrals were made during 2020/21 period equating to 19.1% of our referrals being repeated within 12 months. This is a smaller cohort of children re-referred when comparing with 2019/20 (171), but due to the decrease in referrals (992 in 2019/20 to 750 in 2020/21) this has increased our rate.

Although this has taken us above target of 18%, we remain below our statistical neighbour (20.8%), national (22.6%) and the regional average (22.4%), as recorded for 2020 in the LAIT.





ASSESSMENTS - TIMELINESS

DEFINITION

Of those assessments completed in a period, the percentage completed within 45 working days. Day zero is the first working day on or after the start date of the referral, or strategy discussion decided to initiate S47 enquiries, or where new information indicates that an assessment should be undertaken. The end date is the first working day on or after the recorded date the Team Manager closes the single assessment.

A process indicator as a proxy measure for improved child safety and how quickly services can respond when a child is thought to be at risk of serious

PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS

86.4% of our C&F assessments were completed within 45 working days during the 2020/21 period. This is in line with our statistical neighbour (87.7%) and regional average (88.8%) and above the national average (83.1%) as recorded for 2020 in the LAIT, but below our target of 90%.





87 children were subject to a Child Protection Plan (CPP) as at the end of March 2021. This is comparable to the 85 children open to a plan at the end of March 2020.

Darlington currently has a 38.8 rate per 10,000 for children subject to a CPP which is lower than our statistical neighbour (53.9), regional (70.0) and national average (42.8) as reported in the 2020 LAIT.





FORMANCE ANALYSIS At the end of March 2021 the figure for children becoming subject to a CP plan for a second or subsequent time within 2 years of the previous plan ending was 9.4% (this relates to 11 children from 4 families previously being subject to a CP plan). This is above our internal target of 6 %, however the family sizes should be taken into consideration which are similar to previous years.

There has been no child who has been subject to a CP plan for 2 or more years and we continue to remain below our targets of 5%.





PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS

272 children are currently in care as at March 2021 which is comparable to the number of children (270) that were in care as at March 2020.

The rate of Children in Care (CiC) per 10,000 population is currently at 121.1 which is higher than our statistical neighbours (100.3), regional (108.0) and national average (67.0).

The courts have been closed for a considerable time since March 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and when open are hearing a smaller number of cases. As a result, there have been less cases able to be progressed to ceasing to be in care due to awaiting action such as adoption orders being granted or care orders being discharged by the court.



CHILDREN IN CARE - ALLOCATION & REVIEWS

DEFINITION

The percentage of Children in Care cases which should have been reviewed during the year ending 31 March that were reviewed on time during the year and the percentage of Children in Care cases that were allocated to a qualified Social Worker at the end of the month.

To improve compliance with local authorities' legal requirements under the Review of Children's cases Regulations 1991. The purpose of the review is to consider the plan for the child's welfare, to monitor the progress of the plan and amend it as necessary in light of changed information and circumstances. The statutory intervals are within 20 working days of placement, then within 3 months and 6 monthly thereafter, but reviews may be rescheduled or held inside these intervals if there are significant changes to the child's care plan.





On the whole stability is associated with better outcomes; placement instability has been highlighted as a key barrier to improving educational outcomes. Proper assessment and an adequate choice of placements to meet the varied needs of different children are essential if appropriate stable placements are to be made. Inappropriate placements often break down and lead to frequent moves. Nevertheless, the circumstances of some individual children will require 3 or more separate placements during a year if they and others are to be kept safe.

8.1% of Children in Care (CiC) as at March 2021 have had 3 or more placements within the previous 12 months. This is below our target of 10.0% and our statistical neighbours (9.9%) regional (10.0%) and national average (10.0%) as recorded for 2020 in LAIT. All children who are placed over 20 miles away are confirmed as appropriate and for the benefit of the child by the head of service each month.

As at March 2021, 71.9% of our children in care, aged under 16 (who have been looked after for at least 2.5 years), have been in their current placement continuously for at least 2 years. This is positively above our target of 68.0% and our statistical neighbours (69.3%), regional (69.0%) and national average (68.0%).

9.4% of our children in care have been placed 20 or more miles away from home as at March 2021 which is similar to that at March 2020 (9.6%) and below our target of 10.0%.









CARE LEAVERS

DEFINITION

The percentage of 'former relevant' care leavers aged 19-21 who were in suitable accommodation at their most recent contact, and the percentage who were not in employment, education or training at their most recent contact. Published data is included for comparison however data submitted to DfE by Local Authorities captures the young person's status around their 19th, 20th, or 21st birthday each year rather than the latest available information.

This measures accommodation and employment outcomes for young people formerly in care - a key group at risk of social exclusion. It is intended to increase the proportion of former care leavers who are in suitable accommodation and employment, education or training.


PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS

98.1% of our care leavers were in suitable accommodation at the end of March 2021. The 1.9% of care leavers in unsuitable accommodation was due to being in custody. This is above our target of 95%.

Of the young people (aged 19-21) as at March 2021 who were not in education, employment or training (NEET).

- 5.3% NEET because of illness or disability
- 8.8% NEET because of other circumstances
- 10.5% NEET because of pregnancy or parenting.

This equates to 24.6% of our care leavers which is below our internal target of 30% NEET.

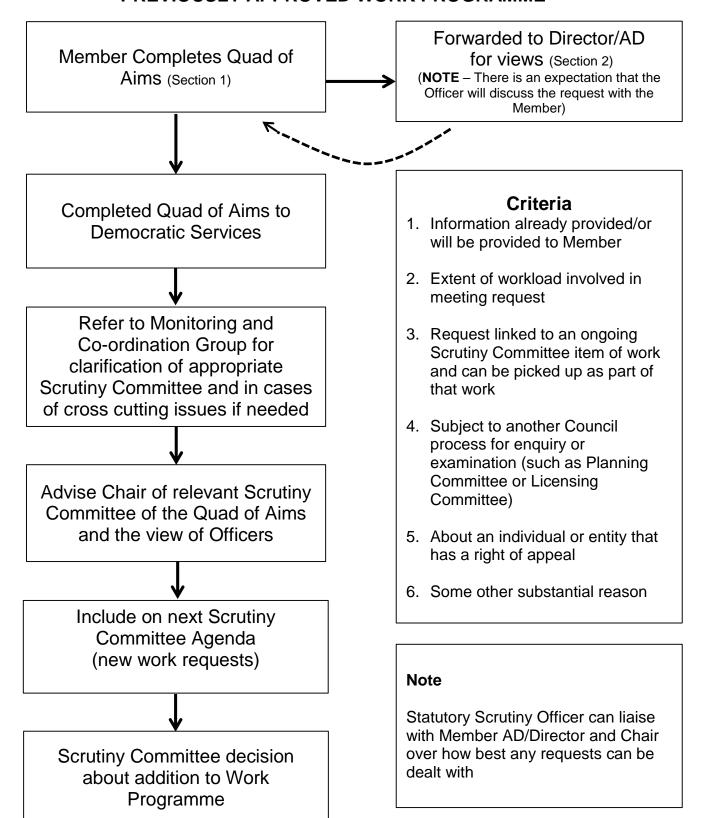
